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IT'S BIGGER THAN THAT! Excerpts from a piece by The Rev. Dr. Patrick Duggan, UCC

Recently, the UCC Church Building & Loan Fund hosted a training session for church leaders who are within two years of starting a building project. These sessions always create a sense of excitement and possibility. I was a speaker for the event, so I devoted a lot of thinking to my remarks.

What could I possibly say to... 60 or 70 church leaders... (who) came together to learn all they could about church building projects. ... And that is exactly what happened. But that is not all that happened. It's bigger than that. (Editor's bold type.)

We church folk are so used to being on the defensive that we occupy a rut of low selfesteem. Religion is irrelevant. The bible

is anachronistic. People are not interested in going to church. Denominations are shrinking. Giving is down. Progressive Christian ideas cannot stand up to the Religious Right. Like lemmings moving toward a cliff, we continue with the observances of our faith; but the background, music of gloom and doom is always playing in the soundtrack of our minds

It's bigger than that.

Do we gather, meet, fight for justice, sing, dance, worship, preach and regularly affirm our covenant with God and each other for the small reason of habit? For personal edification? Because grandmamma and 'nem did it? Because we like the music? Because

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we're the 1 percent who like getting up on Sunday mornings? Or because we feel like we're the last bastion of Christianity before the secular humanists take over?

It has to be bigger than that.

Whenever we pray for wars to end, we affirm God's intent for peace. Whenever we fight for LGBTQ rights or for Palestinian self-determination, we declare the superiority of God's vision for human relationships. Whenever we drink from the symbolic cup and share the bread we don't buy, we assert God's abundance as the preeminent economic principle. We worship, we live and we love so that God's will be done on earth as it is in heaven

Most bible versions say "the kingdom of heaven" or the "kingdom of God." Some of us get that nobody knows what a "kingdom" is anymore, so we say "realm of God." If Jesus would rewrite his words in 2014 American English, he would probably call it "God's Economy." And he would tell us to keep pouring out our lives until God's Economy emerges as the ultimate global reality.

A New Heaven and a New Earth. That is how big it is.

EDITOR'S NOTE:

Yesterday, handbills for two local Christmas bazaars arrived in my email. Here, amidst the marketing hype over Halloween, came notices of fund-raising enterprises "trading on" Christmas. Immediately, memories of the excitement and bustle of Christmas bazaars in my past flooded in. But, those thoughts quickly faded as my evolving perspective on the meaning and origins Christmas made the idea of a Christmas bazaar, a church fundraiser no less, seem inappropriate. However, one bazaar gives all profits to feed the hungry.

Bible Bookworms studies of progressive theologians have fostered reconsideration of how the Christmas narratives may fit into personal theology. At the same time, the huge impact of American *cultural* Christmas comes into sharper focus.

Just as All Peoples seeks to know and understand the historical Jesus it would appear that understanding the role of the Christmas story in a progressive faith may call for re-evaluation.

What can/should a progressive make of the Christmas scriptures? How valuable are the various birth narratives of Jesus, written so long after his birth? How come the charming story of shepherds watching over their flocks out on the hills by night would hardly have happened in December since keeping sheep out in the hills at night

only happens in warmer seasons in that country? How come recent scholarship suggests that Jesus was probably born in Nazareth, not Bethlehem? ...and so on!

Yet the symbolism of Advent as a time of preparation for the coming of Christ into the world seems so appropriate... a time to revisit, refocus and reformulate.

Bible Bookworms will focus on the progressive meanings of Advent on Nov. 16th, Dec. 7th and 21st! The UCC Writers Group, a team of particularly erudite and progressive pastors, has produced some

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messages about Advent and Christmas that will serve as springboard to some lively discussion and perhaps rekindle some enthusiasm for a fresh and more meaningful Christmas spirit. Stand by for some thoughtful, spirit-filled discussion at Bible Bookworms!

Some faith communities are taking emergency moral action by sheltering immigrants whose families are threatened to be torn apart due to deportation of one or more members. Others face almost certain death if returned to the terror they fled.

AMERICANS UNITED FOR SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE STANDING GUARD

Houses of worship should obey federal tax law and stay out of partisan politics during election season, Americans United for Separation of Church and State says.

Americans United sent more than 84,000 letters to clergy across the country to remind them that federal law prohibits tax-exempt entities, such as houses of worship, from *endorsing candidates* for public office.

"The tax code is very clear when it comes to churches and politics," said the Rev. Barry W. Lynn, executive director of Americans United. "A house of worship can't endorse or oppose candidates for office. Our letter simply reminds religious leaders about what the law requires, why it makes sense and how it could affect them."

While APUCCers tend to have strong party affiliations, they are also active "good citizens." Some are working non-partisan phone banks to get out the vote this election.



ORGANIZED BACKLASH AGAINST EQUAL RIGHTS!

"Manif pour tous" is the French version of an anti-gay movement sweeping across Europe. The UK, France, Germany, Italy, Slovakia, Croatia and Latvia are countries where the radical right group have a toehold. The group seeks to cancel gay marriage and remove their children!

"All Out" seeks to stop the movement before it ignites more vulnerable countries.

Strategy steps are: 1–Expose their lies.

- 2–Cut them off from international networks.
- 3– Get leaders fighting for love.
- 4– Rally everyone who believes in love and equality to the cause.
